NOTES ON THE HISTORY OF 521 FIELD SURVEY COMPANY R.E.

1. INTRODUCTION.

It is believed that there are no detailed "official" unit histories for the Field Survey Companies raised in the second world war. It is now perhaps doubtful if any will be compiled. For some of the companies, brief anecdotal souvenir histories were produced towards the end of the war using the cartographic and photographic skills and mobile printing resources of the units.

Hopefully, the following notes on various sources of historical material will serve in lieu of a unit history until the compilation of one is addressed, if ever.

There are four obvious sources of historical material: -

- a. Brigadier A.B. Clough's monograph "Maps and Survey", H.M.S.O., 1952.
- b. References, mainly war diaries, held in the National Archives at Kew.
- c. Anecdotal souvenir histories produced by the units.
- d. Personal accounts or reminiscences and correspondence regarding the same.

2. NOTES FROM "MAPS AND SURVEY" BY BRIGADIER A.B. CLOUGH, H.M.S.O., 1952.

For each theatre of war Brigadier Clough describes the historical background and the strategical and military considerations followed by the survey planning and an account of the phases of the campaign including the survey involvement. These are followed by sections on the maps and map production, triangulation and field surveys, aerial photography and survey and map supply and distribution. For anyone interest in military survey in general or survey unit histories in world war two "Maps and Survey" should be consulted. Notes towards unit histories have been extracted from "Maps and Survey" and these are shown below, sometimes in full, sometimes in brief.

Since these notes were made, "Maps and Survey" has been scanned by DSA and is now available on the DSA website. The notes below may still however provide an "at a glance" summary of the unit's involvement in world war two.

For 521 Field Survey Company R.E. the index in Brigadier Clough's "Maps and Survey" gives : -

During June, 13 (Corps) Field Survey Company went to Middle East, and one topographical section of 521 Field Survey Company was detached to South Eastern Command for special work in connection with the survey fixation of heavy guns, which were then being installed in the Dover area, as an answer to the German "heavies" which were firing across the Channel from the French coast near Calais. It was necessary to establish accurate cross-Channel observations to connect up the triangulations of Great Britain and France, and this was successfully accomplished. (Clough 38)

Survey Directorates were assembled for the Allied Planning Headquarters for Operation "Torch" and for the British First Army which was to take part. 518 Field Survey Company R.E. was mobilized for

this operation and ceased to be under Home Forces control. By October, 1942, the Survey organization in Home Forces was as under : -

Director of Survey, with Survey Directorate at G.H.Q. (now Colonel A.B. Clough who replaced Colonel Fryer on his appointment to Middle East in January, 1942).

A small Directorate with each of the Home Commands and certain Corps.

Field Survey Companies Nos. 14, 516, 519, 520, **521**, 523 (515 in Northern Ireland), 1 Canadian. General Survey Sections Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6.

Field Survey Depots Nos. 3, 4, 5, 7, 10 (No. 6 in Northern Ireland).

Air (Survey) Liaison Section No. 1.

With the formation of Supreme Headquarters Allief Expeditionary Force (S.H.A.E.F.) in January, 1944, the survey organization in prparation for "Overlord" was as under:

3. NOTES FROM REFERENCES, MAINLY WAR DIARIES, IN THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES, KEW.

As far as possible, the brief notes from unit war diaries listed below are in chronological order. War diaries from world war two are generally foolscap in format. In addition to the war diary proforma which may be in manuscript in pencil or ink, or typescript, the files usually contain the periodic returns of soldier and officer strengths. Some also contain technical diary annexes but many are confined to mundane notes on arrivals and departures and movements and their content as a source for a historical and technical account can be disappointing. The following "shorthand" notes are generally based on initial hasty examinations of the diaries simply to assess their scope and possible worth as sources for a unit history.

521 Corps Field Survey Company War Diary December 1940 - December 1941.

The War diaries for this unit are in manuscript, ink, but neat and legible and, for a change, quite descriptive of the work done.

December 1940 - January 1941.

7 Dec Maj W.E. Browne appointed O.C. Location York. Capt A.J.D. Halliday M.C. 2 ic. 2Lt D.H. Haycock Print Officer. A workhouse at Ouseburn, 13 miles west of York was taken over as accommodation.

- 10 Dec First draft arrived, mainly drivers. 4 15cwt Chevrolet trucks arrived.
- 18 Dec 2 Lt P.A. Mann joined.
- 19 Dec CSM Newell and draft from Fort Southwich arrived., nearly all survey personnel.
- 30.Dec Work commenced at Ben Johnsons Printing Works, York. All tradesmen except Topo Draughtsmen are highly skilled having been in civilian trades pre-war
- 3 Jan First consignment of tech equipment arrived.
- 6 Jan Tech personnel at Ben Johnsons are supplementing 13 Fd Svy Coy work.
- 10 Jan Drawing Cassini grid on OS 1:2500 for AA work.
- 15 Jan AD Svy Col E.R. Peake and O.C. visit AA Bde HQ Hartlepool and Newcastle.
- 21 Jan Survey party for Newcastle commence AA surveys.
- 22 Jan First mobile press collected from makers, Crabtree, Leeds. All 20 1:2500 complete.
- 25 Jan Two Topo Sects to Grantham and Humber for AA surveys.
- 30 Jan First photo-mechanical lorry arrives. List of work achieved.

February 1941.

- 1 Feb First map spraying job. A cellulose lacquer makes the map waterproof but still possible to write on with chinagraph. Lacquer sprayed by "Aerograph" driven by 2-stroke motor.
- 4 Feb Photo-mech veh in commission.
- 19 Feb Second printing lorry collected. Up to 5000 copies per hour per machine, usually 3,500. Max size 19 x 24 inches.

23 Feb Second print lorry taken to Hayes Middx and handed to 14 Company. O.C. discusses possible move to SE District with AD Svy SE Dist Lt Col H. Bagot. List of work achieved.

March 1941.

5 Mar Adv party to go to Dane Court, (a school) Woking on 11 Mar.

8 Mar Coy inspected by Col R.E. Fryer D Svy GHQ.

11 Mar OC and advance party depart.

14 Second party arrive Woking.

21 Mar Arrangements for takeover of survey work in Dover area, Hythe, from 14 Fd Svy Coy. 2 Lt P.J/. Carmody ic.

29 Mar Lt A.L. Hargrace, 2 Lt E.R. Couradi?, 2 Lt W.P. Smith, 2 Lt E.W. Lawrance arrive. List of work achieved. Not noted.

"Brief History of the Dover Area Survey detachment RE."

Early in July 1940 the need for survey for artillery purposes arose when Corps and Divisional artillery were taking up their allotted positions. Coast fixed defences were also increasing the numbers of C.D. Batteries, all of which required surveys of the positions of the guns and their arcs of fire. Heights of the D.R.F. Sets were also required. The long range guns required special surveys. A few surveys had been carried out by surveyors lent by the O.S. Southampton. As the demand grew the responsibility became AD Svy's Eastern Command, Lt Col V.E.H. Sanceau. For this purpose Capt W.E. Browene and 2ic 14 Coy then at Norwich were detached and placed in charge of the O.S. detachment. Surveys in the field commenced 12 Jul 40 and have continued to present date. (There follows a detailed list of surveys and surveyors). Capt Browne left on 1 Dec 40 to take over 521 Coy. 2 Lt Mann then relieved 2 Lt Carmody who left the unit for overseas on 8 Aug 41. Det now under 2 Lt Couradi? The long range gun surveys were on the same grid system as that in France, the Nord de Guerre. A quick extension was made based on the observations for the UK-French connection of 1862 and temporary values were calculated. Simultaeneously, a new connection was observed across the channel and when completed the guns were surveyed on this system. The guns on railway mountings were fired from curved railway tracks or "spurs", these being graduated on the grid bearings of the French grid. See "Report on Cross-Channel Triangulation Conversion by Capt W.E. Browns R.E." Surveys and computations were also made on behalf of the R.N. when the survey for the bombardment of Calais was being made. Also for Dunkirk. 521 Coy is now responsible for this work. Coast Defence, AA and Long Range Gun surveys are still in progress.

Appendix C is "Star Planisphere and Star Chart for Northern Constellations" by Maj W.E. Browne R.E. Apendix A is a paper on "Future Map Policy Overseas".

21 Jul Unit moves to Tadcaster, Yorks. "Inholmes" List of tasks.

August 1941.

GHQ Conf and briefing by Col Browne on Operations in Middle East. The capture of Bardia was materially assisted by the modern Italian plans from aerial photography that we had captured previously. Crossing of the River Juba profited from the good gridded maps prepared from air photos for the operation. List of postings in and out of officers. Carmody for M.E. for instance.

September 1941.

Just the usual list of tasks.

October 1941.

Maj Browne ordered to collate all data of his surveys in Persia and Iraq and to report to GSGS W.O. Tasks listed at end. Mostly Arty and AA surveys.

November 1941.

17 Nov OC attended lecture by Hotine on Surveys in East Africa. Map-shooting from gridded aerial

surveys of Juba River crossing again described.

26 Nov One repro sect under Lt A.L. Hargrave to GSGS Cheltenham for temp duties.

27 Nov. Maj Browne's method for plotting a perspective grid on an oblique air photo by the Browne Oblique Grid Plotter, description at Appx A.

Tasks listed at end. Mostly Arty and AA surveys.

December 1941.

Still shown at Tadcaster, Yorks.

13 Dec Photo-mech vehicle and detachment return from Cheltenham.

Tasks listed at end
